Opportunities for EDUC 201 students include:

- Training on positive youth development, classroom management, ages/stages, adapting lessons, and the Experiential Learning Model.
 - Adapt youth lessons to the appropriate age level.
 - Teach/Facilitate adapted hands-on lessons.

Urbana Park District (UPD) manages 22 parks and natural areas, as well as several facilities. **Anita Purves Nature Center** is a nature museum and environmental education facility open free to the public. The center features hands-on exhibits and offers programs for local classrooms and the public. Staff facilitate programs at various natural areas in the district as well as off-site programs in local schools, with community organizations and more.

Opportunities for EDUC 201 students include:

School Field Trips: Under the supervision of the Environmental Education Coordinator, the Environmental Education Leaders develop and lead nature-based programs at the Urbana Park District's natural areas. Students on School Field Trips volunteer with 1.5- to 2-hour- long structured programs that often include an introduction of concepts, and a hike accompanied with activities throughout the adventure. All programs follow Next Generation Science and IL Learning Standards.

Naturalist in the Classroom programs: Under the supervision of the Environmental Education Coordinator, the Environmental Education Leaders develop and lead nature- based programs for local educators in their classrooms. Students who volunteer with Naturalist in the Classroom programs will assist with hour-long structured programs that often include an introduction of concepts, activities, and education animal presentations. All programs follow Next Generation Science and IL Learning Standards

Afterschool programs: Afterschool leaders plan and facilitate activities afterschool for Urbana Middle School, Dr. Preston Williams Elementary, and King Elementary students. Programs are weekly Tuesday through Thursday, 3-5:30pm in November in December. Students that volunteer with afterschool programs will assist with the implementation of activities for a mix of grades from that school. NOTE: this program is grant dependent and not finalized.

Volunteer Hours: There are volunteer opportunities Monday through Friday anywhere between 8am– 2pm. School Field Trips and Naturalist in the Classroom programs are scheduled upon request and don't have a consistent schedule. Starting in November, Afterschool Programs offer volunteer opportunities roughly 3 - 5:30pm Tuesday through Thursday. Volunteers will sign up with the coordinator and will be updated as new programs and opportunities arise. You may select one shift or as many as you would like.

Requirements: EDUC 201 students who would like to work with the Urbana Park District will need to complete a volunteer information form and agree to a background check, after being assigned to this community placement. In addition, those wanting to volunteer with the afterschool programs will need to be fingerprinted with the Urbana School District. Orientation/training sessions are available for the above volunteer opportunities.

Outside the center is the Friendship Grove Nature Playscape and the trailhead to the Busey Woods natural area.

Opportunities for EDUC 201 students include:

Forest School: Under the supervision of the Environmental Public Program Coordinator, the Forest School program leaders develop and teach environmental education programs at the Friendship Grove Nature Playscape and Busey Woods (both locations outside, next to the Anita Purves Nature Center). Participant fees fund these programs.

Children age 6-12 years participate in this drop-off program each Wednesday from 1:15-4:15pm, September 3 - December 17 (2025). Forest School themes are emergent—depending on current events in nature and the interests of the students—yet may include topics such as fire building and safety, outdoor cooking, making/working with tools, and creative problem solving.

Volunteer Hours: Volunteers will work as many Wednesdays as possible to meet their hour requirement. Volunteers can sign up to work from ~12:45-5:00pm (for the full duration of the program) or from ~2:30-5:00pm (to assist primarily with snack time).

Requirements: complete a volunteer information form and agree to a background check, after being assigned to this community placement. Orientation/training sessions may be required for the above volunteer opportunity.

Girls go For It (GGFI) is an after-school program dedicated to educating and empowering young girls from local schools and/or community partners. Our mission is to develop the leadership potential, entrepreneurial spirit, and professional abilities of young girls through building confidence, knowledge, and creating opportunity. The leadership gap in the professional world between men and women is no secret; statistics show girls are discouraged from speaking in class and are more likely to be interrupted. Through directed professional leadership training, we will give young girls the foundation they need to bridge that gap and use their voice as an avenue to advocate.

GGFI's curriculum is focused on self-confidence, empowerment, challenges women face, entrepreneurship, and career building. Activities for the girls include team building, discussions, presentations, and more.

Opportunities for EDUC 201 students include:

GGFI Coach: Our coaches will receive training and support to be a successful coach, mentor, and leader. They will collaborate with other coaches to create the best environment for the girls. Coaches will teach lessons based-off of a set curriculum (both in English or Spanish). This experience will allow coaches to utilize and continue to develop public speaking skills and facilitation skills. The coaches will also have opportunities to develop new activities and discussion topics for future Girls Go For It classes. We are looking for EDUC 201 students who are creative and excited to engage with young girls at local schools or community partner locations. This experience should appeal to students interested in public service education, program planning, mentorship and advocacy, and social justice issues/activism in education.

As this is an educational and empowerment program for girls, we are specifically interested in obtaining female coaches from EDUC 201. Providing our students with strong female role models/mentors is at the cornerstone of our mission and program objectives.

Volunteer Hours: Must commit to **Wednesdays 3:30-5pm**. These times may vary slightly and any additional days will be determined at a later time.

Requirements: There will be mandatory training for coaches before the program begins. Training sessions may be in-person or virtual with exact dates/times to be determined.

The Holocaust Education Center and Illini Hillel at the University of Illinois would like to offer education students a unique opportunity to advance their understanding of teaching about the Holocaust and genocide, to learn skills required for addressing issues of the Holocaust and genocide in the classroom and be provided with the opportunity (tentative) to participate and plan Holocaust Remembrance activities in conjunction with commemoration of Kristallnacht in November and Yom Hashoah in late spring. This opportunity is intended to be useful for students in exploring Holocaust and genocide education, while learning the skills of implementing state mandated learning.

The students participating in this project will:

- Become familiar with the Illinois State Mandate for instruction about the Holocaust and genocide.
- Become familiar with the correct methodology for teaching about the Holocaust and genocide (including outlines and guidelines).
- Become familiar with various local and national resources available for implementing Holocaust and genocide methodology.
- Be exposed to the workings of a local volunteer organization and how it functions.
- Prepare short presentations on **resistance and rescue efforts** during the Holocaust to share with the group and possibly select classrooms in this area via Zoom (upon request).

The Holocaust Education Center (part of Champaign Urbana Jewish Federation – Ma’ayan Weinberg, Executive Director) is staffed with experienced volunteers that have taught Holocaust curriculum in area schools and academic settings for several decades. They will provide the information, along with selected guest speakers, at most meetings which will be conducted via Zoom or in-person at the Cohen Center for Jewish Life (on UUC campus). Members of the Holocaust Education Center will team up with Erez Cohen, Executive Director of Hillel, to provide informational background to the Holocaust and assist students with the planning in conjunction with the various events and activities.

Volunteer Hours: Zoom meetings will be held in early evening hours (6-8 pm or 7-9 pm TBD). In person sessions at Cohen Center will run at the same hours, TBD, with dinner provided. Additional times will be scheduled based on student availability.

iRead • iCount is a community program that organizes volunteers to work with kindergarten and first grade students on literacy and math skills. For one hour a week, over nine weeks, volunteers help students who need additional practice to develop and reinforce basic skills that are crucial for academic success. The iRead Program is offered in the spring and the iCount Program is offered in the fall at Urbana elementary schools.

Opportunities for EDUC 201 students include:

Students will volunteer in Kindergarten and First Grade classrooms in the Urbana School District. Students will work with one student at a time for 10-15 minutes but will see four to six students in one hour. Volunteers go to the same classroom at the same time each week, and usually see the same students. This fall's iCount Program focuses on math skills. EDUC 201 students will gain experience working one-on-one with students in the primary grades.

Volunteer Hours: All volunteer timeslots will be on Monday-Friday, during the school day. The students get to choose their school, the day of the week, and their timeslots from a list of times that are provided by classroom teachers. There is a lot of flexibility for volunteers to choose timeslots that work for their schedules as there are timeslots in the morning, in the middle of the day, and in the afternoon. EDUC 201 students can reach 20 hours by volunteering multiple times each week. Volunteers will not report to schools during the week of October 13-17, when the Urbana School District is on Fall Break. The iCount Program will not operate from November 24-28, which is the week of Thanksgiving.

Requirements: Volunteers will be trained on the activities that they will do with students, and will be oriented to their building's sign-in procedures, location of program materials, where they will work with students, etc.

***Students must be available for the in-person orientation meeting at the College of Education in room 192 on Thursday, September 18 at 4 pm where they will get signed up, complete background check documents, and receive training. Students should bring a computer to the meeting. They should also bring a completed paper copy of Urbana's volunteer application, which can be found on the iRead • iCount website.**

Salt & Light is a community-development-based poverty alleviation organization that operates non-profit grocery and thrift stores. The stores work on a participant-based payment option that allows people experiencing financial hardship to earn store credit through volunteering. Participants also take part in classes and educational activities, and small affinity group meetings as part of their program. Thrift and grocery store revenue provides economic support for programs.

Opportunities for EDUC 201 students include:

- **Thrift store**—stocking, staging, rotating, and quality control of inventory and presentation in the thrift store
- **Processing**—working alongside participants and staff to sort, process, and price donated items for resale.
- **Course Allies**—attending classes and educational activities as supportive co-participants; LIMITED OPENINGS, so students need to express interest early

These opportunities should appeal to students interested in food security, dignity-based poverty alleviation efforts, and personal and community development.

Volunteer Hours: *Preferred thrift store and processing volunteer hours are Monday – Friday between 9 am – 3 pm.* Other hours are available Monday – Friday 3pm - 8pm, Saturdays 9 am – 8 pm, and on Sundays from 11am - 5pm. Course Ally times will depend on program schedules.

Training Session: Students must attend one of Salt & Light's regular weekly volunteer orientations, Mondays from 12-1pm or Thursdays from 6-7pm.

Opportunities for EDUC 201 students include:

CLASSROOM ASSISTANT (Early Childhood/Elementary): This position typically works with infants through age 8 but may be asked to work with children up to age 12. It works with adult staff and volunteers on Sunday mornings in one of three age-specific classrooms: infants to 5 years old, PreK-K classroom, or grades 1-3. Play, storytelling, crafts, and conversation help provide engaging learning and social experiences in these rooms.

Duties may include:

- Caring for and playing with children, soothing children, changing diapers, bottle feeding, serving snacks, and communicating with parents.
- Coming up with, preparing for, or leading age-appropriate crafts and activities.
- Parent communication/Sign-in and sign-out.
- Setting up or cleaning/disinfecting learning spaces.
- Coming up with, preparing for, or leading age-appropriate crafts and activities.
- Occasionally provide childcare for evening or weekend events such as our Saturday morning Parent Support Group, Parent's Night Out, Playground Playdates, or church meetings and events.

Volunteer Hours: On-site Sunday mornings between 9:30-11:30 am and various evenings or weekend events.

Requirements: Previous experience in early childhood education or working with infants or toddlers is preferred. Must be able to pass a background check.

Projected number of openings: 8

CLASSROOM ASSISTANT (Middle and High School): This position typically works with youth in 4th through 8th grade or high school. They may occasionally help with childcare for kids between 5 and 12 years old. This position works with adult volunteers on Sunday mornings in a mixed middle school classroom or with the high school youth group. These groups play games, build community, do service activities, and engage in conversation to create engaging learning and social experiences.

Duties may include:

- Helping facilitate conversation and get-to-know-you
- Preparing for or leading age-appropriate activities
- Parent communication/Sign-in and sign-out.
- Setting up or cleaning up learning spaces
- Occasionally provide childcare for evening or weekend events such as our Saturday morning Parent Support Group, Parent's Night Out, Playground Playdates, or church meetings and events.

Volunteer Hours: On-site Sunday mornings between 9:30-11:30 am and various evenings or weekend events.

Requirements: Previous experience working with teens or tweens. Desire/comfort level to initiate and sustain conversations and relationships with middle school and high school youth. Must be able to pass a background check.

PROGRAM ASSISTANT: Assist the Director of Faith Development in administrative tasks related to carrying out the regular program for children, youth, and adults.

Duties may include:

- Supporting classes including lesson planning, gathering supplies, making sample crafts, and making copies.
- Creating bulletin boards
- Writing newsletter articles, creating resource lists, and other parent/family communication
- Planning, gathering materials, and working at programs for children & families
- Data entry for weekly class attendance
- Occasionally provide childcare for evening or weekend events such as our Saturday morning Parent Support Group, Parent's Night Out, Playground Playdates, or church meetings and events.

Volunteer Hours: Regular weekly office time (pick your hours) Tuesday through Friday between 9 am and 6 pm, occasional evening or weekend events
