Opportunities for EDUC 201 students include:

- Training on positive youth development, classroom management, ages/stages, adapting lessons, and the Experiential Learning Model.
 - Adapt youth lessons to the appropriate age level.
 - Teach/assist in facilitating adapted hands-on lessons.
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Volunteer Hours: Various programming during the school day in partnership with local schools, as well as options for after-school programming and occasional weekend workshops. We will work with you to place you in programs that work with your school schedule.

Training Sessions: We will schedule a training/orientation before the beginning of the in-school/after-school programming. This will take between 4 and 6 hours and will take place at the Champaign County Extension Office. Dates for the training will be set once students have selected their site placements.

Unit 4 requires background checks, as well as some of our other partner sites. A short orientation may also be needed at certain sites.

Tentative Schedule and Planned Activities: Monday- Friday, with potential weekends. Some activities may include: STEAM, robotics, cooking, drones, college and career readiness, photography, and gardening.

DREAAM Serving over 200 PreK through 12th grade students this fall, DREAAM is a community impact organization with the mission to reach, teach and empower youth and their families with a targeted focus on Black males. DREAAM stands for Driven to Reach Excellence and Academic Achievement for Males, and the primary aim is to:

- increase positive outcomes—academic achievement, mental health, college and career readiness
- decrease negative outcomes—suspensions, drop-out rates, violence

Dream Big! is the organization's college and career readiness program designed to provide STEM education, mentoring, social emotional learning, sports, and social connectedness.

Opportunities for EDUC 201 students include:

- providing in-person learning support through tutoring, homework help, literacy enrichment, small-group social emotional learning, and STEM (science, technology, engineering, art, and math) skills

Urbana Park District (UPD) manages 22 parks and natural areas, as well as several facilities. **Anita Purves Nature Center** is a nature museum and environmental education facility open free to the public. The center features hands-on exhibits and offers programs for local classrooms and the public. Staff facilitate programs at various natural areas in the district as well as off-site programs in local schools, with community organizations and more.

Opportunities for EDUC 201 students include:

FRESH Crew: Under the supervision of the Environmental Services and Outreach Coordinator, in collaboration with our Natural Areas Manager and a Teen Program Supervisor, the park district offers a volunteer stewardship program aimed at ages 12-18. This program offers volunteer hours they can claim for school, extracurriculars, Scouts, etc. We meet twice a month on **Saturdays from 2-4PM** during the school year. We control invasive plants, collect seeds from native plants, pick up trash, help with gardens, and beautify our parks!

Bat Festival 2026 will be held **Saturday, September 26**. Volunteers can assist with set up, tear down, welcome tables, monitoring stations, getting supplies put together, helping with crafts, etc.

Teen Hangout Zone: The park district offers a free after-school program once a month, aimed at ages 12-18, typically at the Phillips Recreation Center. Teens are encouraged to spend time on any number of available activities, which can include arts and crafts, a nail painting station, using provided laptops or playing video games on provided consoles, enjoying a fire outdoors, meeting educational ambassador animals from the Anita Purves Nature Center, and more. Snacks and drink are provided. This program is also incorporated with the annual 3v3 Basketball Tournament for teens, held at the Health and Wellness Center.

Volunteer Hours: In order to earn at least 20 hours, students must be available on **Saturdays** for FRESH crew meetings twice a month **and** the Bat Festival on September 26. The Teen Hangout Zone only meets once a month, which is an option for additional hours, if needed.

Requirements: EDUC 201 students who would like to work with the Urbana Park District will need to complete a volunteer information form and agree to a background check, after being assigned to this community placement. In addition, those wanting to volunteer with the after school programs will need to be fingerprinted with the Urbana School District. Orientation/training sessions are available for the above volunteer opportunities. Volunteers must be able to travel to the sites.

Urbana Park District manages 22 parks and natural areas, as well as several facilities. UPD offers our community a wide variety of opportunities year-round including outreach programs, fitness/wellness, community/arts, sports/athletics, nature/environmental, and school/afterschool programs. **Anita Purves Nature Center** is a nature museum and environmental education facility open free to the public. The center features hands-on exhibits and offers programs for local classrooms and the general public. Outside the center is the Friendship Grove Nature Playscape and the trailhead to the Busey Woods natural area.

Opportunities for EDUC 201 students include:

Forest School: Under the supervision of the Environmental Public Program Coordinator, the Forest School program leaders develop and teach environmental education programs at the Friendship Grove Nature Playscape and Busey Woods (both locations outside, next to the Anita Purves Nature Center). Participant fees fund these programs.

Children age 6-12 years participate in this drop-off program each **Wednesday from 1-4 pm**. Forest School themes are emergent—depending on current events in nature and the interests of the students—yet may include topics such as fire building and safety, outdoor cooking, making/working with tools, and creative problem solving.

Volunteer Hours: Volunteers will work as many Wednesdays as possible to meet their hour requirement. Volunteers can sign up to work from ~12:45-5:00pm (for the full duration of the program) or from ~2:30-5:00pm (to assist primarily with snack time and cleanup).

Requirements: After placement is confirmed, students provide their availability during the semester and submit Parks district volunteer form. Once student's Wednesday afternoon availability is confirmed, proceed to schedule an APNC orientation and walk through. Paperwork must be completed in person with a pen-to-paper signature for the Cottage (Admin office assistant) to process. After criminal background check returns no hits, the volunteer may start immediately. Fingerprinting may need to be done later.

Volunteers supporting the Membership Team will primarily assist with community outreach and engagement efforts designed to connect girls and families with Girl Scouts. Girls on the Run is an after-school program designed for girls in grades 3-5. We are a physical activity-based positive youth development program designed to enhance girls' social, emotional and physical skills and behaviors to successfully navigate life experiences. The program's intentional curriculum places an emphasis on developing competence, confidence, connection, character, caring and contribution in young girls through lessons that incorporate running and other physical activities. Teams meet at various schools in Unit 4, or at the Stephens Family YMCA

Opportunities for EDUC 201 students include:

- Coaches will be leading participants through a practice twice a week. They will be provided with all materials and curriculum necessary. Practices include discussion, activities, and physical activity.

Volunteer Hours: Teams will meet either on Monday and Wednesday or Tuesday and Thursday each week for 10 weeks. Practice times vary per site, but all are about 1 ½ hours long.

Requirements: All volunteers must complete online training (~5 hours), in-person training (~3 hours), and fill out a background check form and be fingerprinted if necessary. (All costs are handled by the Stephens Family YMCA, so no cost to the students)

The Holocaust Education Center and Illini Hillel at the University of Illinois would like to offer EDUC 201 students a unique opportunity to advance their understanding of teaching about the Holocaust and genocide, to learn skills required for addressing issues of the Holocaust and genocide in the classroom and be provided with the opportunity (tentative) to participate and plan Holocaust Remembrance activities in conjunction with commemoration of Kristallnacht in November. This opportunity is intended to be useful for students in exploring Holocaust and genocide education, while learning the skills of implementing state mandated instruction.

The students participating in this project will:

- Become familiar with the **Illinois State Mandate** for instruction about the Holocaust and genocide.
- Become familiar with the proven methodology for teaching about the Holocaust and genocide (including outlines and guidelines).
- Become familiar with various local and national resources available for implementing Holocaust and genocide methodology.
- Be exposed to the workings of a local volunteer organization and how it functions, including hearing local survivor stories.
- Prepare short presentations on **resistance and rescue efforts** during the Holocaust to share with the group and possibly select classrooms in this area via Zoom (upon request).

IMPORTANT: Attendance Policy

Due to the nature of this experience, **we are asking you to commit to all of the Tuesday in-person sessions.** We will **not** be able to repeat or recreate any of these sessions. Your attendance and participation will be required for you to complete this volunteer experience. **Emergency conflicts and/or illness will be the only exception.** We understand that this requirement may present challenges for one or more of you; that is just the nature of university scheduling and of this experience.

If you cannot commit to all of the sessions, you may want to consider a different volunteer experience in which you can create your own schedule. We sincerely hope that each of you will be able to join us this semester for this experience but understand the many demands on your time outside of the classroom.

Members of the Holocaust Education Center will team up with **Erez Cohen, Executive Director of Hillel**, to provide informational background to the Holocaust and assist students with the planning in conjunction with the various events and activities.]

iRead ● iCount is a community program that organizes volunteers to work with kindergarten and first grade students on literacy and math skills. For one hour a week, over nine weeks, volunteers help students who need additional practice to develop and reinforce basic skills that are crucial for academic success. The iRead Program is offered in the spring, and the iCount Program is offered in the fall at Urbana elementary schools.

Opportunities for EDUC 201 students include:

Students will volunteer in kindergarten and first grade classrooms in the Urbana School District. Students will work with individual students for 15 minutes at a time but will see several students a one-hour volunteer session. Volunteers go to the same classroom at the same time each week and usually see the same students. This fall's iCount Program focuses on math skills. EDUC 201 students will gain experience working one-on-one with students in the primary grades.

Volunteer Hours:

All volunteer timeslots will be on Monday-Friday, during the school day. The students get to choose their school, the day of the week, and their timeslots from a list of times that are provided by classroom teachers. There is a lot of flexibility for volunteers to choose timeslots that work for their schedules as there are timeslots in the morning, in the middle of the day, and in the afternoon. EDUC 201 students can reach 20 hours by volunteering multiple times each week. iCount volunteers will work with students between October 1 and December 11, 2026. The iCount Program will not operate during the week of October 12-16 as it is the Urbana School District's Fall Break nor during the week of Thanksgiving.

Requirements:

Volunteers will need to complete a volunteer application and send it to the Urbana School District once they receive their EDUC 201 placement. The Urbana School District will then complete a background check on all volunteers because they work directly with students. (Detailed information on how to complete the volunteer application and background check will be emailed to students once they receive their EDUC 201 placement.) Volunteers will

also be given information on how to select and sign up for their volunteer timeslots in classrooms. On September 17 volunteers will be trained on the activities that they will do with students and will be oriented to their building's sign-in procedures, location of program materials, where they will work with students, etc.

***Students must be available for the in-person orientation/training meeting at the College of Education in Room 42A on Thursday, September 17 from 4 - 5:30 pm. Students should bring a computer to the meeting.**

Salt & Light is a community-development-based poverty alleviation organization that operates non-profit grocery and thrift stores. The stores work on a participant-based payment option that allows people experiencing financial hardship to earn store credit through volunteering. Participants also take part in classes and educational activities, and small affinity group meetings as part of their program. Thrift and grocery store revenue provides economic support for programs.

Opportunities for EDUC 201 students include:

- **Thrift store**—stocking, staging, rotating, and quality control of inventory and presentation in the thrift store
- **Processing**—working alongside participants and staff to sort, process, and price donated items for resale.
- **Course Allies**—attending classes and educational activities as supportive co-participants; LIMITED OPENINGS, so students need to express interest early

These opportunities should appeal to students interested in food security, dignity-based poverty alleviation efforts, and personal and community development.

Volunteer Hours: *Preferred thrift store and processing volunteer hours are Monday – Friday between 9 am – 3 pm.* Other hours are available Monday – Friday 3pm - 8pm, Saturdays 9 am – 8 pm, and on Sundays from 11am - 5pm. Course Ally times will depend on program schedules.

Opportunities for EDUC 201 students include:

CLASSROOM ASSISTANT (Early Childhood/Elementary): This position typically works with infants through age 8 but may be asked to work with children up to age 12. It works with adult staff and volunteers on Sunday mornings in one of three age-specific classrooms: infants to 5 years old, PreK-K classroom, or grades 1-3. Play, storytelling, crafts, and conversation help provide engaging learning and social experiences in these rooms.

Duties may include:

- Caring for and playing with children, soothing children, changing diapers, bottle feeding, serving snacks, and communicating with parents.
- Coming up with, preparing for, or leading age-appropriate crafts and activities.
- Parent communication/Sign-in and sign-out.
- Setting up or cleaning/disinfecting learning spaces.
- Coming up with, preparing for, or leading age-appropriate crafts and activities.
- Occasionally provide childcare for evening or weekend events such as our Saturday morning Parent Support Group, Parent's Night Out, Playground Playdates, or church meetings and events.

Volunteer Hours: On-site Sunday mornings between 9:30-11:30 am and various evenings or weekend events.

Requirements: Previous experience in early childhood education or working with infants or toddlers is preferred. Must be able to pass a background check.

CLASSROOM ASSISTANT (Middle and High School): This position typically works with youth in 4th through 8th grade or high school. They may occasionally help with childcare for kids between 5 and 12 years old. This position works with adult volunteers on Sunday mornings in a mixed middle school classroom or with the high school youth group. These groups play games, build community, do service activities, and engage in conversation to create engaging learning and social experiences.

Duties may include:

- Preparing for or leading age-appropriate activities
